



INDIGITIZATION FUTURES FORUM

Welcome to the Indigitization Futures Forum at the University of British Columbia. We are gathering on the traditional, ancestral, unceded territory of the Musqueam people to learn from each other. The Forum will highlight information management practices that are working well in communities, and discuss challenges and obstacles that need to be overcome. By the end of the weekend, the Indigitization program hopes to have a clear direction on how best to support communities in British Columbia to digitize and manage Indigenous knowledge going forward.

The Forum includes workshops on digitizing specific formats such as VHS and images, a workshop on accessing language documentation for revitalization, and an introduction to content management software (Murkutu) designed to support cultural protocols. We will all come together at panel sessions led by former Indigitization grant recipients to hear about how communities are making digital audio recordings available to their communities through language programs and other initiatives, and how they are dealing with the challenges of determining rights and developing protocols for access. We will also hear how some projects have developed techniques and projects beyond those funded by Indigitization.

Indigitization is grateful to our major sponsors: the Vancouver Foundation, the Institute for Critical Indigenous Studies and the Sustainable Heritage Network. Thank you to everyone who worked to bring us together for this important discussion.

Description	This workshop will provide an introduction to the development of Mukurtu CMS, current examples of community projects and hands on practice with the platform. Participants will engage in discussion and receive training in the core elements of Mukurtu: Communities, Cultural Protocols, Categories, and Digital Heritage items, as well as Mukurtu Mobile, the companion mobile collection app.	This workshop will provide an orientation to the vastly useful resources for language and culture revitalization available in memory-keeping institutions such as archives, museums and libraries. Students will come away knowing where to look for previous documentation of their language and culture, what to look for, how to access and interpret such materials, how to digitize, store and manage data once it has been recovered, which hardware and software tools can contribute to the research, and how these reclaimed digital materials can serve as tremendous assets to the ongoing documentation and revitalization of language and culture.

Description	This workshop will cover standards and best practices for digitizing VHS cassettes. Instructors will present workflow and project planning tips and recommendations for video digitization. Participants will receive hands-on practice with two different methods of VHS digitization, suitable for differing budgets and workflows.		This workshop will provide an introduction and overview of digitizing photographic materials in a few common formats using both flatbed and film scanners. Planning an image digitization project, scanning workflows, digital image processing and correction, and derivative creation will all be discussed and/or demonstrated. The basics of document scanning will also be presented in less detail with a focus on how it differs from image digitization.

SUSTAINABLE DRINKING WATER AT THE LONGHOUSE

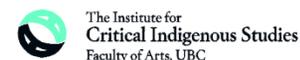
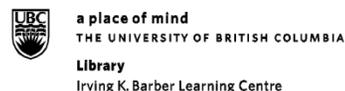
The United Nations has recognized access to water as a basic human right. At UBC, access to safe drinking water is something that many of us take for granted, but many First Nations communities in Canada do not have access to safe drinking water.

The availability of water, the quality of that water, and the future of water resources are major concerns facing First Nation communities. At the Longhouse, the First Nations House of Learning encourages sustainable and respectful use of water. Bottled water is not served at this gathering. All water served originates from the City of Vancouver water systems. Drinking Metro Vancouver water saves money, reduces greenhouse gases, and prevents plastic bottles from ending up in landfills and oceans.

The Indigitization Futures Forum has provided reusable water bottles that can be filled from the water stations at the First Nations Longhouse venue.
